BIG 12 POSTSEASON NOTES

Big 12 Earns a Record 11 Postseason Bids in 2007-08

A Big 12-record 11 teams were invited to compete in 2008 postseason play. Eight teams received bids to the NCAA Championship while three participated in the WNIT. The league's eight NCAA berths are also a Big 12 record.

Texas A&M earned the league's automatic berth to the NCAA tournament after winning the Phillips 66 Big 12 Championship. Teams receiving at-large bids were regular season champion Kansas State, Baylor, Oklahoma State, Oklahoma, Nebraska, Texas and Iowa State.

Colorado received the Big 12's automatic berth into the WNIT with Texas Tech and Kansas getting at-large bids. All three received first round byes.

The Big 12's 11 postseason teams were second among all conferences. The Big East had 12 invites, but has four more teams than the Big 12. The Big 12 and the Big East tied for the most NCAA bids with eight.

The conference's previous record for postseason bids was nine in 1999 and 2004. The previous Big 12 high for NCAA Tournament invitations was seven in 2001, 2002 and 2004. Since the inception of the league in 1996-97, the Big 12 has received 95 postseason berths, including 71 in the NCAA Championship field.

Since 2000, the Big 12 and Big East have made the most appearances in the NCAA tournament with 56, including the eight selections in 2008.

Big 12 Season Ends in Elite Eight and WNIT Semifinals

The 2008 Big 12 season came to an end when Texas A&M lost to Tennessee in the Elite Eight and Colorado fell to Marquette in the WNIT semifinals. Oklahoma State joined A&M in the Sweet 16 as both made their program's second Regional semifinal appearance. The Aggies advanced to the Regional final for the first time in school history.

Big 12 First League to Go 8-0 in NCAA First Round Games

The Big 12 became the first league in the history of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Championship to post an 8-0 record in first round games. A league has placed eight teams in the NCAA field on six occasions. Following is a look at the first round records of the conferences with eight tournament teams.

Big 12 Women's Basketball Hits One Million in Home Attendance

Big 12 women's basketball reached one million in home attendance for the second consecutive year and third time overall during the 2007-08 season. The conference crossed the one-million threshold on March 22 when Texas Tech hosted Texas State in a WNIT game. The Big 12 has led the nation in attendance the past eight years and is the only league to hit the one-million milestone in NCAA history. In addition to 2006-07 and 2007-08, the conference also recorded one million fans in 2001-02. The 2006-07 cumulative attendance of 1,023,576 is the NCAA record. In 2007-08, the Big 12 recorded 1,014,309 patrons.

Big 12 Results in First and Second Round Games

The Big 12 has played 71 first round contests in 12 years with a 53-18 (.746) mark. The 53 teams that advanced to the second round compiled a 28-25 (.528) record.

The Big 12 has gone 34-9 in first round action the past seven years, including an 8-0 mark in 2007-08 and a 7-0 record in 2001-02. The conference is 17-17 in second round contests over the same span.

Big 12 Results in Regional Games

Including two in 2008, Big 12 teams have made 28 appearances in the Sweet 16 since 1997. The league has compiled an 8-20 (.286) record from 1997-08. The eight teams that advanced to the Elite Eight compiled a 3-5 (.375) mark. Big 12 squads won Regionals in 2002 (Oklahoma), 2003 (Texas) and 2005 (Baylor).

Big 12 Hosts Oklahoma City Regional

The Big 12 will serve as a regional host from 2008-10, beginning with the Oklahoma City Regional in 2008. The league will host the 2009 Oklahoma City Regional and the 2010 Kansas City Regional.

Iowa State Hosts First and Second Rounds

Iowa State hosted first and second rounds in Des Moines in 2008, marking the fourth straight year a Big 12 school has served as a host in the current format (Texas-2007 Austin, Colorado-2006 Denver, Texas and Texas Tech co-host-2006 Dallas).

Big 12 Teams' Have 131 NCAA Championship Appearances

Teams from the Big 12 Conference have made 131 NCAA Championship appearances, including the eight bids in 2008.

Big 12 Teams Have 157 NCAA Championship Wins

Big 12 teams have compiled 157 NCAA Tournament wins in the 27 years of the event to rank fourth among all Division I leagues. Texas leads the Big 12 with 32 followed by Texas Tech with 30.

Three Big 12 Teams Have Won National Titles

Baylor won the Big 12's first national title in basketball with a 33-3 record in 2005. The 33 wins are a Big 12 high. Texas and Texas Tech have both won national championships while members of the now-defunct Southwest Conference. Texas won the 1986 title with a perfect 34-0 record and is one of only four teams to record a perfect season in NCAA history (Connecticut in 2002 and 1995; Tennessee in 1998). Texas Tech captured the 1993 championship with a 31-3 record. Texas also competed in the 2003 and 1987 Final Fours while Oklahoma advanced to the championship game of the 2002 event.

Three Big 12 Teams Participate in WNIT

Colorado, Kansas and Texas Tech represented the Big 12 in the 2008 Postseason Women's National Invitation Tournament. The WNIT increased to 48 teams in 2007 with each conference getting an automatic bid. Colorado earned the Big 12's automatic berth. All games are played on the campus of a participating team in a single-elimination format.

2007-08 Quick Notes

The Oklahoma City Regional, hosted by the Big 12, had the best attendance of the four regional sites with a total of 19,373 fans for two sessions. Among the eight first-second round sites, Des Moines, Iowa, hosted by Iowa State had the second-highest attendance with 21,772 for three sessions.

For the first time in Big 12 history, the league had eight 20-win teams in 2007-08. The previous high was seven at the conclusion of the 2001-02 and 2000-01 seasons. Colorado was one victory shy of giving the Big 12 nine 20-win teams.

The Big 12 finished 2007-08 ranked No. 1 in conference RPI by Collegiate Basketball News, Jeff Sagarin and collegerpi.com.

Eleven Big 12 teams were either ranked or received votes in both the Associated Press and USA Today/ESPN polls this season. At least five teams were ranked the last 16 straight weeks (Dec. 3-March 17) in the AP Poll, with six teams rated during a four-week stretch from Dec. 24-Jan. 14. Baylor (12/17), Kansas State (16/21), Oklahoma (14/19), Oklahoma State (13/11) and Texas A&M (8/8) were ranked in both final polls.

The Big 12 posted a 129-30 record during regular season non-conference games for a nation-leading .811 winning percentage. The Big 12 ended the season with a 145-41 (.780) non-conference mark, setting Big 12 records for most wins and highest winning percentage.

The Big 12 had a winning record against 26 of 30 conferences it faced (including independents). The Big 12 went undefeated against 16 of 30 other leagues.

The Big 12 was 32-25 (.561) combined vs. the ACC, Big East, Big Ten, Pac-10 and SEC.

The Big 12 played 28 games against ranked non-conference opponents in 2007-08 with an 11-17 record. Nine of the 17 losses were by unranked Big 12 teams to ranked opponents and another five featured a higher-ranked opponent defeating a Big 12 squad. Three of the Big 12's wins were by unranked teams over ranked opponents.

Courtney Paris was a unanimous All-America First Team selection for the third straight season, becoming the Big 12's first three-time first team All-American.

PHILLIPS 66 BIG 12 CHAMPIONSHIP NOTES

Texas A&M became the first No. 4 seed to win the Phillips 66 Big 12 Women's Basketball Championship when the Aggies captured the 2008 title in Kansas City's Municipal Auditorium.

A&M beat No. 3 seed Oklahoma State 64-59 in the title game. It marked the fourth seed's first appearance (1-0) in the final game while the third seed played in the title game for the sixth time (2-4). The five-point margin of victory was the second-closest in a finals game behind ISU's three-point win over Oklahoma in 2001.

Texas A&M and Oklahoma State both competed in the title game for the first time in Big 12 history. The Aggies had made two previous appearances in the semifinals while the Cowgirls had one previous appearance in the semis.

A cumulative attendance of 359,317 has attended the 12 Phillips 66 Big 12 Women's Basketball Championships.

The No. 12 seed picked up its first tournament victory in Big 12 Championship history when Missouri upset No. 5 seed Oklahoma in overtime in the first round.

The No. 1 and No. 2 seeds fell in the quarterfinals for the first time in league history as No. 8 seed Iowa State beat No. 1 seed Kansas State in overtime and No. 7 seed Texas upended No. 2 seed Baylor. In all, five lower seeds topped higher seeds in the 2008 championship.

Seven different teams have won the 12 Phillips 66 Big 12 Women's Basketball Championships. Oklahoma leads the pack with four crowns, all since 2002. Iowa State and Texas Tech have two titles each while Baylor, Colorado, Texas and Texas A&M have one.

Three of the previous six winners of the Phillips 66 Big 12 Women's Basketball Championship have advanced to that season's Final Four (Oklahoma in 2002, Texas in 2003 and Baylor in 2005). Seven of the past 12 participating teams in the title game have advanced to the Sweet 16.

The top seed has a 27-5 (84.4%) cumulative record in the championship. Of the 132 Big 12 Championship games, 100 (75.8%) have been won by the higher-seeded team.

Iowa State (2007), Oklahoma (2004), Texas (2000) and Kansas State (1997) are the only teams in the 12 championships to play on the first day and advance to the final. OU is the only one of the four to win the championship.

Oklahoma and Iowa State have won the men's and women's Phillips 66 Big 12 Basketball Championships in the same year. OU won both 2002 tournaments while Iowa State took both titles in 2000.

Iowa State's Stacy Frese (1998-2000) and Angie Welle (2000-02), and Baylor's Sophia Young (2004-06) are the only players to be named to three All-Big 12 tournament teams. Texas Tech's Angie Braziel (1998-99), ISU's Megan Taylor (1999, 2001), Oklahoma's Stacey Dales (2001-02), Dionnah Jackson (2002, 2004), Leah Rush (2006, 2007) and Courtney Paris (2006, 2007), and Texas' Tiffany Jackson (2004-05) are the two-time honorees.

Baylor *Lady Bears*

Baylor, 25-7, completed the season with 25 or more wins for the fifth straight season, all under head coach Kim Mulkey.

Senior point guard Angela Tisdale finished her Baylor career with 1,373 points and 493 assists. She ranks No. 1 on Baylor's career assist chart and No. 13 on the school's career scoring list.

Tisdale, one of 40 finalists for State Farm/WBCA All-America consideration, led the Lady Bears in scoring for the season with 16.4 points an outing. She was followed by Rachel Allison's 13.1, Jessica Morrow's 11.7 and Danielle Wilson's 10.4 points a game.

In Tisdale's four-year career, Baylor has posted a 110-25 record, winning 81.5 percent of its games.

Allison, a 6-1 forward/post, was the squad's leading rebounder at 8.5 a game. Wilson and freshman Melissa Jones followed with 6.8 and 5.6 a contest, respectively



Colorado *Buffaloes*

Colorado finished the year with a 19-15 record, its most wins since finishing 2003-04 with a 22-8 record.

The WNIT semifinal was CU's first game in April in program history. The Buffs were the last remaining team to play in the Big 12 this season.

Jackie McFarland scored in double figures 94 times in her last 100 games and 102 times in her career, trailing only Lisa VanGoor.

McFarland finished with 1,957 career points, second on CU's all-time scoring list behind VanGoor, who had 2,067 between 1981-85. She also completed her collegiate career second in rebounds (1,049), third in field goals made (671), fourth in blocked shots (138), first in free throws made (586), first in free throws attempted (758), fourth in minutes played (3,928), second in double-doubles (46) and second in double digit rebounding games (48).



Iowa State *Cyclones*

Iowa State ended with a 21-13 overall record, reaching the 20-win mark for the ninth time in school history and the eighth time under head coach Bill Fennelly.

The Cyclones made the NCAA Championship field for the second consecutive season and the ninth time in the last 12 campaigns. Iowa State advanced to the second round for the seventh time in school history. Iowa State is 11-9 in NCAA Tournament appearances.

Iowa State will return all its players next season. With the ACL injuries to Nicky Wieben and Toccaro Ross, the Cyclones will return 100 percent of their scoring and rebounding and will add three newcomers to the mix for 2008-09.

The Cyclones defeated three ranked teams and four regular season league champions during the 2007-08 season. ISU also lost four games to ranked teams by an average of three and a half points per game. ISU earned wins over regular season champs from the Big Ten, Big 12, Missouri Valley and Mid-American conferences.



Kansas *Jayhawks*

Kansas concluded the 2007-08 season with a 17-16 overall mark after falling at Michigan State, 58-54, in the third round of the 2008 Postseason WNIT.

The Jayhawks, who improved from 11-20 in 2006-07 to 17-16 in 2007-08, were led in the game by sophomore Danielle McCray's 18 points. She also had nine rebounds and a personal-best eight steals. McCray led the Jayhawks in scoring, rebounding and steals on the season.

The Jayhawks lose a pair of seniors in forwards Jamie Boyd and Taylor McIntosh from the 2007-08 squad, however, the future looks bright as KU will return 88 percent of its scoring and 80 percent of its rebounding in 2008-09.

In addition, the Jayhawks will add three highly-touted newcomers, including 2008 WBCA All-American Angel Goodrich.



Kansas State *Wildcats*

K-State finished its season with a loss to Louisville in the NCAA second round. It was the 10th NCAA Championship appearance for the program, including five since 2002.

Kansas State has compiled a 5-5 record in NCAA Tournament play since the inception of the Big 12 in 1997.

The Wildcats went 13-3 in the Big 12 this year after tying for last a year ago and captured their second regular season Big 12 title. They are the only program in Big 12 men's or women's basketball history to go from last to first in consecutive years.

Deb Patterson was named Region 5 and Big 12 Coach of the Year while Kimberly Dietz and Shalee Lehning were named to the All-Big 12 First Team. Marlies Gipson was a second team selection.



Missouri *Tigers*

With only one senior on the 2007-08 roster, Mizzou will return all five starters and 98.6 percent of its scoring to next year's squad.

The Tigers set a program single-season record with 197 3-pointers this year, breaking the previous mark of 192 set in 2000-01.

Junior Alyssa Hollins broke two 3-point field goal records in her junior campaign. The guard made 90 threes this season to smash Amanda Lassiter's old single-season mark of 65 and set a career 3-point field goal record of 166, passing Carlynn Savant's previous record of 142.

With its 70-64 overtime victory against No. 13/11 Oklahoma in the Phillips 66 Big 12 Championship, Mizzou became the first 12 seed to advance past the first round.

Hollins, who has accumulated 933 points in her three-year career, is only 67 points away from becoming the 26th player in Missouri history to score 1,000 points.



Nebraska *Huskers*

Yvonne Turner erupted for a career-high 23 points with a career-best five three-pointers as eighth-seeded Nebraska took top-seeded Maryland down to the wire before falling 76-64 on the Terrapins' homecourt in the NCAA second round.

The Huskers finished the season 21-12 after advancing to the second round for just the third time in school history. Prior to the 2008 first round, NU's last NCAA tournament victory was in 1998.

Nebraska has made five straight postseason appearances in head coach Connie Yori's six seasons, including two consecutive in the NCAA Championship.

Kelsey Griffin ended the 2008 season with seven double-doubles and seven outings with 20 or more points, including 26 in the NCAA first round.



Oklahoma *Sooners*

Oklahoma is 17-11 all-time in the NCAA Tournament with a 6-2 record in the second round after ending its season against Notre Dame in overtime.

Ashley and Courtney Paris played their 100th game for OU. The twins have helped OU to an 81-19 record during their careers.

Courtney Paris recorded her 12th 20-point game and the third such production in her last four games. She scored 24 points to pass LaNeisha Caufield (1999-2002) for third on OU's career scoring list. Paris now has 2,141 points and trails only Molly McGuire (2,147; 1980-83) and Phylesha Whaley (2,187; 1997-2000) on the program's career scoring list.

Courtney Paris recorded her 92nd consecutive double-double. She has 97 career double-doubles in 100 college games.



Oklahoma State *Cowgirls*

OSU finished the season with a 27-8 mark and reached the NCAA Sweet 16 for the second time in program history.

The Cowgirls' 27 wins matched the program's highest single-season win total set during the 1990-91 season. That season also produced OSU's only previous Sweet 16 berth.

Sophomore Andrea Riley set OSU single-season records with her 807 points and her 23.1 points per game average.

Riley was also the first Cowgirl to be named an All-American by the Associated Press, receiving second-team honors.

Junior Taylor Hardeman finished the season with 61 3-pointers and now has 125 career treys, placing her second on the school's all-time list.



Texas *Longhorns*

Texas concluded its 22nd all-time appearance in the NCAA Championship, which is tied for third-most all-time. UT has registered a 32-21 (.603) mark in all-time NCAA games.

The Longhorns end their season with a 22-13 mark, going 6-2 down the stretch. The 22 wins are the most for the squad since going 22-9 in 2004-05.

Texas is now 12-7 all-time in NCAA second round games. UT head coach Gail Goestenkors is 10-4 in career NCAA second round games (at Duke prior to this year).

Texas finished the season 6-8 against Top 25 competition - going 3-4 in its last seven meetings against Top 25 foes. In games against Top 10 opponents, UT was 2-4.



Texas A&M *Aggies*

A'Quonesia Franklin moved past Amy Yates for sole possession of No. 2 in career three-point field goals made (157) in the school record books.

The Aggies' 161 three-pointers for the season mark the most in a single season in school history, surpassing the 159 threes set in 1995.

Takia Starks and Franklin were named to the Oklahoma City Regional All-Tournament Team, the first Aggies to be honored on an NCAA All-Regional team.

A&M played 37 games in 2007-08, the second-most in school history, and finished with a 29-8 record to mark the most victories in 34 seasons of Aggie Basketball. The Elite Eight appearance was the first for the Aggie program.



Texas Tech *Lady Raiders*

The Lady Raiders finished the season with a loss to TCU in the third round of the WNIT. In that game, Tech had three players finish in double figures led by junior Keisha Walker's 16 points.

Junior Dominic Seals finished the year with nine double-doubles, which was second in the Big 12. She led the Lady Raiders in scoring at 13.9 points per game, rebounding at 8.3 and blocked shots with 49.

Tech's lone senior, Erin Myrick, finished her playing career at Texas Tech with 850 points, 610 rebounds and 117 blocks. The 117 blocks is tied for sixth on Tech's career blocked shots list.

On the year, the Lady Raiders outrebounded their opponents in 22 of 33 games and held a 15-7 record when doing so.
